But let's back up. Like many people their age, Ed and Teresa have survived bad relationships, harmful circumstances, and poor decisions. Their individual situations led both of them to Port Austin where they

met a couple of years ago. They knew they wanted to be together but also had a lot to overcome.

Teresa was not able to work because of a prior injury. Ed was working but his job was seasonal and did not pay enough to cover rent. The couple did get married on July 11, 2016 and began their love story while living in the woods and using park bathrooms. Eventually they got a tent but were still in the woods. One day

when Teresa was doing some grocery shopping, a stranger overheard her telling the store employee that she and Ed were living in the woods but were hopeful something would break for them soon. The 'stranger' covered Teresa's groceries and promptly contacted a friend from her church who had a camper. He let the couple move into the camper temporarily so they had shelter.

That situation being temporary and Ed's seasonal job almost done, Teresa began calling and asking around about shelters. She knew someone who had toured Good Samaritan Rescue Mission before and highly recommended she contact us. Teresa was very happy with what she was told about the Mission when she called to inquire. In November, 2016, the couple arrived at Good Samaritan.

Roland Watley, men's shelter director, says of the two, "They are persistent, patient, and are intentionally doing what they need to do to get back on their feet."

Ed and Teresa agree, "We love going to church seven days a week, both chapel services here and attending our new church, Bay City First Church of the Nazarene. We appreciate the staff, support of the community, Life Skills classes, and volunteer chapel speakers." They look forward to completing the SAVE (Spiritually Accountable Vocationally Equipped) program soon and getting their own home. Ed will be happy to find a new job. Teresa

would love to come back to volunteer at the Mission and work with the children or maybe lead a Bible study for the women.


