

Meet Cindy. How are you doing today, Cindy? "I'm good. Happy.

Really happy," is her reply. You can find her working in the kitchen at Good Samaritan Rescue Mission and finally living in her new home.

One year ago she was in the hospital on dialysis and eventually found herself at the Mission. "After (being released from the hospital) I had nowhere to go. I had no job, no money and no prospects."



Cindy has been putting her life back together for the past year. When she arrived at Good Samaritan Cindy said she felt numb and abandoned. She had never been homeless before. She was very quiet. After about a month or so, things began to feel better. "Going to chapel twice a day (at the Mission) led me to God. He was my strength. The Mission staff was really great too," reflects Cindy, "They felt like family and were very supportive."

What a difference a year can make! In March Cindy was able to move into her new home. She has spent months working in the Mission kitchen and through our S.A.V.E. program has earned her ServSafe certification. Remembering the days when Cindy was still living in shelter, women's shelter supervisor, Tanida fondly recalls the times Cindy would open up to her and joke with her. "When you saw Miss Cindy smile, you knew it was a good day," comments Tanida.

Cindy has reconciled with her parents and says "they are proud of me." She has a new church family and says her future is now hopeful. Cindy dreams of going to school to pursue web design. "I'm still growing closer to God. I know He's in my life and know I can do anything. I have God back in my life, thanks to the Mission and I believe in myself again," she says. To Cindy, there's an important message to be told, "Don't give up hope. There's always hope."

Psalm 40:1-2

I waited patiently for the Lord; and he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of a horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings.

Every year as Spring approaches, I believe each of us living in Michigan have a great eagerness for the promise of warmth and new growth. New Samaritan Youth Shelter Coming Soon!

The Great Lakes Bay Region is experiencing a new wave of homelessness among 12 to 17 year old teens. Bay and Arenac Counties are not prepared to meet this need because emergency shelter services for youth aged 12-17 are simply non-existent.

Good Samaritan Rescue Mission opened in Bay City in 2005, and almost every year the ministry has expanded to serve more people in their hour of greatest need. Now GSRM is venturing into emergency shelter for homeless teens. A 10-bed shelter for youth, aged 12-17, is being developed in an area of the Mission previously used as rented office space. The new Samaritan Youth Shelter will be licensed with the State of Michigan.

Last September Rescue Ministries of Mid-Michigan launched its 2020 Vision campaign which includes \$600,000 to open the new youth shelter.
