A devastating fire took nearly everything from her in 2022, and she found herself at the door of Good Samaritan Rescue Mission. She had never been homeless. "It was really scary," she said.

Cathy entered our Impact Shelter program and embraced it completely, especially the chapel services. "I thought the mission was going to be just someplace to sleep. I didn't know there



would be so much support and people who care," she said.

This spring, after completing our program and becoming eligible for an Impact Designs move, Cathy finally moved into a new apartment. It was fully furnished with donated household items and designed by a loving volunteer designer who made sure Cathy's artsy, eclectic style shined. There was even a space for Cathy to display her impressive Pez dispenser collection!

Cathy was all smiles on move-in day, so thankful to once again have a safe, secure and beautiful home of her very own.

Katrina and her four young girls were forced to escape an unsafe environment in another county. She called many places in our area for help, but no one had room for them. Shortly

after calling Good Samaritan Rescue Mission, Katrina and her girls were welcomed by helpful and caring staff, and moved into a room of their own.

guest, Katrina participated in life skills classes and chapel services. She found a job and housing, and plans on returning to school to study Criminal Justice. Earlier this year, with the help of our Impact Designs volunteers and staff, Katrina's family moved into their own fully furnished and designed home.

A special call to donors ensured that the mission was able to provide enough bedding for Katrina's four daughters. She was so thankful on move-in day and each of the girls was so excited to have a special place of her very own!

### DIRECTOR'S DESK

Have you ever been on a long business trip? Ever have an extended time away to help family or friends? Ever have a hard day at work? You pull into your driveway and immediately a sense of relief and comfort happens.

#### You are home!

Now think about this scenario. You have been evicted. You had to choose between food, medical care, and keeping your car running. All your material items now sit out on a curb at the side of the road. Your five-year-old child

has no real idea what is happening. They are crying because they are hungry. You rummage through your items on the curb to figure out what can fit in your car. You have \$20 until your next paycheck. How do you keep going?

This is not an uncommon story, in fact around 220 people staying at Rescue Ministries last night can relate to this well. For many of them, this was real, and frustrating, and depressing, and exhausting. One night at the Mission does not make it go away. It's overwhelming. Everything has gone wrong for so long, how can it ever be right.

So, our staff and volunteers take action one person at a time, one day at a time, one conversation at a time, one devotional time together, to help crack open doors to hope. What can you do to help? What can you do to make a difference? Donating is an easy answer, but dollars alone are not the solution. Caring is the solution. Caring is what helps you go the extra mile. How can you increase your caring? By doing something. Care enough to take an action.

Maybe that first action is praying, or bringing excess clothing to the Mission, or going for a tour, or maybe calling to volunteer. Something...We have worked hard to develop meaningful solutions like life skills classes, chapel and devotional times, great meals, supportive parenting, and Impact Designs! ## Stay for the Impact

Most guests first come to us seeking shelter in a time of personal or family emergency. No matter why someone is in need of help, they'll find it at the mission, thanks to our caring staff and generous supporters. Every guest receives access to shelter and facilities, two nutritious meals per day, and any required clothing and hygiene products.

However, our prayer is for people to go beyond emergency services and take part in our **Impact Shelter program**. This program focuses on spiritual and long-term needs, leading to God-honoring, sustainable solutions, and permanent housing.

Impact Shelter guests receive additional help in these key areas:

#### CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

Hearing the good news about Jesus is the first step towards a changed life. In our chapel, pastors, church leaders and staff share daily messages of hope. Guests are also encouraged to become involved in a local church.

#### LIFE SKILLS CLASSES

Our trained staff collaborates with other service organizations and businesses – such as Mid-Michigan Adult & Teen Challenge and Wildfire Credit Union – to present life skills training each weekday. Sessions cover topics such as: Parenting, Health & Wellness, Financial Literacy, Communication & Conflict Resolution, Housekeeping & Time Management.

#### CASE MANAGEMENT

Impact Shelter guests regularly meet with a case manager to assess needs, coordinate resources and celebrate successes. Case managers also discuss ways to grow spiritually, and introduce additional tools and resources, all to help guests become productive community members.

### HOUSING COORDINATOR & IMPACT DESIGNS SERVICES

Our housing coordinator meets with Impact Shelter guests to assist with post-shelter housing options. Guests who complete our Impact Shelter program are also eligible for Impact Designs services.
